### Hurrah, Spring has Sprung Submitted by Elisabeth Staro, Beautification Committee

There are welcome signs of activity and renewal everywhere, birds are singing sweetly. Now is the time to take stock of your yard: the good, the bad and the ugly. Can you see through your windows? Are shrubs scraping your house or covering your walk? Are those pesky weeds cropping up? Get your weeding done now before they settle in, flower and spread.

Make a "to do" list. Look carefully at your trees and shrubs. Do they need shaping, trimming, or removing? Unless they are flowering ones (trim right after flowering) now is a good time to tidy them up. Remove damaged, crossing, and crowded limbs. Shaping trees when they are young is best to develop good structure. Pruning and shaping are important for plant health and beauty. Avoid Crape Myrtle Murder with annual selective pruning. Lopping off the tops is bad for them and all trees.

Make generous safety zones under your trees. This protects the roots and trunks from mowers and whackers. It then creates a new planting place for green mulch, such as thyme to help the tree. You can also mulch with many other products, but the more natural the better. Do NOT mound mulch up against a tree trunk or shrub stems, this will choke them. Mulch depth should be three inches and three inches away from the trunk with the appearance of a donut rather than a volcano around your tree. Mulch helps to keep roots cooler, moister in hot weather and warmer in winter. Choose your mulch carefully; cheap unknown sources may contain weedy surprises. Use Preen in your mulched areas! It does not kill weeds (sorry, they still need to be pulled, with as much root system attached as possible) but it prevents new seed germination and improves conditions over time. It does not harm surrounding plants and trees, pets or children. It does help you!

Last but not least, DO NOT plant tender annuals too early! Mid May is still the target for planting. The soil has had time to warm up enough not to shock new plants and the danger of a late frost has past. You can have your plans and purchases made but keep them in a protected space, covered at night if needed, or in your garage. Resist the warm days in mid-April...pull weeds instead.

The best overall planting time is approaching, nurseries will be stocked with new materials for now, but realize supply chains are also affected in this business. If you like something, ask, read the tag, and look it up to make sure it is suitable future size, deer

resistant and buy it. If you are looking for ideas as to what to plant be sure to check out the updated Fernbank recommended plant list, which is located under the Architectural Review Committee on the Fernbank website <u>www.fernbankatcresscreek.org</u>. ### **Creatures Great and Small**

According to Safety and Roads Committee member Tim Murphy, the 2021 annual Urban Deer Hunt, which ended on January 15<sup>th</sup> had a harvest of 12 deer, a mix of does and bucks in the Fernbank community. The Department of WV has approved the Urban Hunt for 2022 but the dates have not yet been publicized and are not likely to be announced before early September. We should have details for you in the next newsletter.

As the Fernbank deer are roaming the yards and checking out the bird feeders (a herd of seven stop by this writer's birdfeeder in the evening often around cocktail hour), those of us fond of humming birds are waiting in great anticipation for the arrival of our ruby-throated friends. According to the Spring 2022 Hummingbird Migration Map & Sightings a hummingbird was spotted in Hedgesville on April 14<sup>th</sup> and in fact, one was spotted on Greystone Drive on April 24<sup>th</sup> so, be on the lookout, get the nectar or sugar water ready and hang those feeders!

Our tiny friends will begin to leave in September and all will be gone by mid-October. West Virginia hummingbirds need 53 hours of flying at their average migrating flight speed of 30 mph to fly to the most distant Mexican border 1,600 miles away.

## Just so You Know

The Safety and Roads Committee has followed up regarding the downed streetlight on Fernbank Drive. The power company confirmed replacement was still on the schedule once the parts are received (so goes the supply chain). The committee also would like you to know that the Sheriff's Office has been notified regarding speeding on Shepherd Grade Road coming over the hill towards the entrance for Fernbank. 
